HISTORY REPEATING ITSELF!

British Member of Parliament William Wilberforce toiled for many decades to end the scourge of slavery in Britain in the 18th and 19th centuries.

At first, he was one of just a few voices to speak out. But after years of dedication, he helped pass a ban on the slave trade.

We can take a lesson from Wilberforce. He knew the institutions that supported slavery were strong – in Parliament, in the commercial sectors, among investors. He knew that many people made huge profits from slavery, just as many do today with abortion. But he also knew that implacable determination and hard work would educate ordinary people and this movement would grow as a voice for the voiceless ... and eventually win.

Our struggle in the United States to end another injustice has also gone on for more than four decades. And we are growing in strength. Polls show many more Americans consider themselves pro-life, with pro-life opinion especially strong among the young. We are being increasingly effective in highlighting the evil of abortion and sensitizing a nation to the suffering abortion causes unborn babies and their mothers. We're moving the culture in our direction.

Just as Wilberforce could not possibly give up after his first major victories, we cannot possibly give up now. We must persevere like Wilberforce did ... to change a culture.

As Wilberforce showed us, one person can make an enormous difference! We can also do the same.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

2nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

- This Friday, January 22nd, is the 53rd anniversary of Roe v. Wade. The Catholic Church has also established this as the Day of Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children. For those not joining us on the bus to Washington, D.C. this year for the March for Life, there will be a special program at the church this day to pray for the protection of innocent human life in the womb and other aspects related to promoting the Culture of Life. On January 22nd, there will be Mass at 6am (before we leave for the march) - anyone is invited to attend this Mass, though. Then, starting at 9am there will be exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, which will last until 12noon. Interspersed during this time will be periods of silence as well as public devotions, such as the Rosary for Life, the Litany for Life, and the Chaplet of Divine Mercy. Also, in the evening from 6:30 to 7:30pm, the Blessed Sacrament will again be exposed in the church. After a period of silent adoration, the Rosary for Life will be prayed. You are encouraged to make a visit to the church at some point during these four hours to pray. Please see further information in today's bulletin.
- 2. From January 18th through 24th, Christian churches across the country mark the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. Let us continue praying for unity within the Body of Christ, so that all disciples of Jesus may truly be one body in Christ. In this way, we will give a united witness to the world of the eternal love of Jesus for each and for all.
- On Saturday evening, Jan. 23rd, from 6:15 to 9pm our next youth ministry gathering will take place in the social hall. This will be a movie night, and will be a great time for us to gather again after bowling (yeah, never enough snow for snow tubing).
- 4. According to a 2010 Marriage Report conducted by the University of Virginia, there is between a 27 to 36% chance of divorce for first-time marriages. Here are factors they discovered that decrease the risk of divorce: 30% reduction if over \$50,000 is earned annually by a couple; 25% reduction if they graduated from college; 24% reduction if they married over 25 years of age; 14% reduction if their parents are still married; and 14% reduction if they have a religious affiliation. Bottom line keep coming to Mass!

SCRIPTURE REFLECTION

Jesus transformed water into the very best wine served at the wedding feast in Cana. And he can do the same with our lives. Sometimes, we come to Jesus with empty jars. We feel we have nothing to offer, that our efforts have failed. But we don't need to work the miracle. We just need to do "whatever he tells" us.

Often that may mean doing something that doesn't make sense on the surface. The servers were probably skeptical about filling the jugs with water. But they did it anyway. In our moments of emptiness, we too need to do what Jesus asks of us. We need to pray (even when we don't hear an answer). We need to participate in the sacraments (even when they don't seem to help). We need to follow the commandments (even when they strike us as difficult or irrelevant). We need to love our neighbors (even when they don't love us back). We simply need to do what Jesus asks of us and then allow him to do the rest. Only when we are willing to follow his directions can he transform our emptiness into joy.
